MUSICIAN YOU MOST ADMIRE?

Miriam Makeba for what she stood for, how much she achieved and her glorious voice. She was the first African recording artist to win a Grammy. She was a vocal, truthful activist. The length and depth of her career and her life are an inspiration all round.

FAVOURITE NEW ARTIST?

My fellow Zambian artists James Sakala, Mumba Yachi and Wezi are three I love.

MEMORABLE MUSICAL ENCOUNTER?

Being involved in a choral project with Hugh Masekela for the London Cultural Olympiad in 2012. He is such a force, both musically and as a human being.

WHAT ARE YOU LISTENING TO?

My favourite album comes from Cape Verde: *Djâm Brancu Dja* from Bulimundo. They are the band that popularised the *funaná* style. When I listen to this album, I get goose bumps.

MUSICIAN YOU MOST ADMIRE?

I admire Katchass, considered as the king of funaná. He was the one who took funaná to the international musical stages. I admire how he was able to keep together the band Bulimundo, up to the day of his death.

FAVOURITE NEW ARTIST?

Lucibela, an artist of the new generation in Cape Verde and a great friend. I think she will be the next great Cape Verdean voice.

MEMORABLE MUSICAL ENCOUNTER?

Thanks to the RFI Award I won in 2015, I toured to 15 African countries. In Mali, I had a great moment during a workshop on Malian music discovering different traditional instruments. I then participated with my musicians in a jam session with Boubacar Traoré and local musicians.

FIRST ALBUM YOU EVER BOUGHT?

Lura's Eclipse. I have always loved her music.

YOUR HIDDEN TALENT?

I asked my musicians for their opinion. And they all said: *la cuisine*! Indeed, I love cooking.

FAVOURITE NEW ARTIST?

As I mentioned, Gabriel Kahane, then Norwegian songwriter Thomas Dybdahl, and if anybody still hasn't heard about the Icelandic hand Kaleo check them out!

MEMORABLE MUSICAL ENCOUNTER?

Playing a couple of tours with Peter Rowan. To be beside him on the stage was one of the strongest moments in my musical life.

FIRST ALBUM YOU EVER BOUGHT?

Red Hot Chili Peppers – *One Hot Minute*. I took my bass guitar and practised those songs for months!

IF YOU WEREN'T A MUSICIAN, WHAT WOULD YOU BE?

I would probably run an activity around nature – permaculture gardens or beekeeping. Who knows, maybe there is still time to explore other parts of the inner world.
